

Victoria's Chance Activity:

Who chooses? Who benefits? Who pays? What's fair?

[These four questions can be a useful tool for evaluating any policy or system. Posing the questions is a great way to stimulate critical thinking.]

As a class, or in small groups, discuss the following:

(Be sure to consider all of the people or groups who may choose, benefit, or pay in each situation. Pay should be interpreted broadly to include non-monetary costs.)

- Who can best make choices about a child's education?
- Who decides what a good education is?
- Who benefits when we limit parents' choices of schools?
- Who benefits when parents have more choice in schools?
- Who pays for Victoria's school?
- Who pays for public schools in Ghana?
- Is it fair that some schools are better than others?
